

Student FAQs

1. What is the GRC?

The Graduate Research Conference gives students a venue for displaying any research, creative, or scholarly project. It gives students the opportunity to present their results to a broad audience and gain constructive feedback.

2. Why should I present at the Graduate Research Conference?

Presenting lets you put the finishing touch on your research, creative, and service learning project. You'll prepare your findings and present them before a wide audience of faculty, administrators, friends, and family. You'll gain valuable professional skills for your career or continued education.

3. Who attends the GRC?

Faculty, fellow students, parents and other family, friends, the general UNH community, alumni, the general public, and visitors from local and regional business communities and government offices.

4. What are the costs to register and to present for the GRC?

There is no registration fee for GRC. However, if you are presenting a poster or PowerPoint oral presentation, costs for the production and/or printing of your presentation materials are the responsibility of the student presenter.

5. Who do I talk to about presenting at GRC?

6. Research Deadlines?

No, your research does not have to be completed in order to register. Registration opens in January and closes in March. Research and presentation materials (poster, oral, film, paper, performance or other format) must be complete for presentation at the event for which you have registered.

7. What if my research project is the work of more than one student? Can we register all our names?

Yes, you can register more than one name (or "author") per presentation. The registration database can accommodate multiple authors (up to fifty), **however only one student from the team must be designated to input registration information for the entire group.** This student will need to provide specific information about each author (presenter) – i.e. name, email address, status, major, presentation title and faculty advisor.

8. Can I register for more than one event?

Yes, you can register for more than one event.

9. I want to change my final presentation title or edit my personal information – do I have the ability to edit my registration information?

10. Can I invite my family and friends to watch me present at the GRC?

Yes, feel free to invite whomever you wish to come to the GRC.
